Digital Donations

You are, no doubt, all aware that we are collecting for Lifelites over the next few years and aim to raise £20,000 by the end of 2025. To aid this we have opened a relief chest with the Masonic Charities Fund which means we can claim the 25% gift aid for every applicable donation. To make collecting for relief chests easier the MCF have created a QR code for us that you can see here.

This QR code will make collecting from chapters, lodges and individuals much easier, all you have to do is take a photo of this card, keep it on your phone and show it to people when they say they want to donate. Use this wherever and wherever you are, so long as you have an Internet connection!

The benefits of Digital Donations

- No need to hold cash or have unnecessary physical contact.
- Fast and simple donation process.
- Donate before, during or after all Masonic and non-Masonic events as and when
- convenient (in the middle of a lodge meeting might be frowned on, for example).
- Donors can keep a record of all their donations by requesting email receipts.

Whether you use the QR code or follow the URL https://gtap.uk/e1072 you will be taken to a web page where you need to provide certain details. The following will help you to help those who are filling those details in.

- The address details are obvious.
- Name of Lodge/Chapter This is the donor's lodge and is used to keep tabs on how much a given lodge or chapter has donated. If the donor is not a freemason then just put your own lodge.
- Number of Lodge/Chapter to be credited The number of the lodge or chapter they provided in the previous box.
- Appeal name This can be left blank since we are only collecting for Lifelites.

Beda Chapter Update

2024 has been a busy year for Beda Chapter so far with rideouts, social and charity events.

We supported the Province of Bedfordshire in delivering Easter Eggs to the children's wards at Bedford and Luton Hospitals and donated boxes of TLC Bears to the Hospitals and the Keech Hospice. We assisted SERV Bloodbikes in delivering test sample boxes to the Keech hospice.



We have continued to run the monthly "Crazy Legs Draw" at our social events to support local charities including the Bedfordshire 2026 Festival, SERV Bloodbikes, Keech Hospice, Respite Care at Home, Saturday Outreach Service Bedford, Faces, Azalea and Leighton Linslade Helpers.

Beda members are keen volunteers, e.g. supporting Kids in Action activities for children with disabilities, and SoS Bedford feeding and providing care to the homeless Bedford. In the last 12 months, 4 BEDA members in SERV have made 311 free urgent deliveries of life saving blood products, patient samples, Human Donor Milk, medical equipment and drugs.

We have run rideouts to France and Belgium, Boxmoor, Grafham Water and Warwick, met neighbouring Chapters, attended the National Rally and will shortly be returning to Wales for our annual tour. Our members supported Dave Day, The Distinguished Gentlemen's Ride and the Army Benevolent Fund ride.

We continue to welcome new members and patched Rocksteady and Ploughman with our now traditional ceremony delivered by our President at The Keep, the Bedfordshire Masonic HQ. All the new Freemasons introduced to Freemasonry by Beda since 2018 are progressing well in their Masonic careers, while our Associate Members, or "Clangers", are helping to develop and grow Beda in key ways showing how inclusive our association really is.







The 21st National Rally 2025 will be hosted 25th to 27th July by Beda at Leighton Buzzard Rugby Club supported by the Cobblestones, Hallstone, Iceni Norfolk, Oxonian, Shires and Suffolk Chapters. We are looking forward to a really memorable and enjoyable event. Tickets are available here:

Our main charity highlight of course, was the raising of £20,000 in just 8 months, for the donation of a blood bike to Severn freewheelers at the Prescott motorbike festival – achieved in the main from our members, and through sponsored lodge visits with our President talking about the Widows Sons, along with a donation of £4k from Province and the MCF. This has also appeared on the front page of the Worcestershire Quarterly newsletter (the "Source"), highlighting the great charity work of the Widows Sons.

President Worcestershire Chapter

Community Service: Blood Biking

Worcestershire, like so many other parts of the UK, is now seeing unprecedented demands on the NHS in respect of the transport of blood, platelets, samples, surgical instruments, human donor milk and many other clinical products. There is an immediate answer to this need. It takes the form of a local community 'Blood Bike'.

In Worcestershire and the surrounding area, this falls to the 'Severn Freewheelers Emergency Voluntary Service', Chaired by Paul Fairbank, which is totally funded from local private charitable donations and fundraising efforts - A quite magnificent achievement that has earned it's moniker of 'small charity, big achiever' status. It is part of the National Association of Blood Bikes, that ensures that the UK has 'coast to

coast' blood bike service coverage.

When you see a 'blood bike' on the road, remember that the rider is an unpaid volunteer, working to professional standards and providing the service to the NHS, free of charge. They are one of the 'Third Sector Charities' within the UK, that makes a difference to the well being to citizens on a daily basis. This is all due to the incredible teamwork and commitment made by every member, spread across every county in the UK.

Current estimates suggest that the volunteering and charitable work carried out by all the UK Third Sector Charities, creates an annual value equivalent of 15 percent of UK gross domestic product of approximately £324 billion per year. More specifically, the work of the 'Blood Bikes' is in the top 1% of critical value, generated by services in this sector.



With its roots going back over half a century, the concept of a rapid response motorcycle based charity, run by volunteers has an impressive track record. It can proudly demonstrate decades of service to the NHS and the wider community. It has become an integral part of the NHS front line services, delivering an efficient and effective 'cost friendly' free service. Thus removing the burden on the NHS from being forced to use expensive taxi or alternative unregulated ad-hoc based transport mechanisms, for the movement of emergency supplies.

The riders (who are all Advanced trained Riders), dispatchers, supporters and fundraisers come from a variety of backgrounds. Hence its ability to meet the increase in demands, and the need to diversify its services, to respond to the time sensitive and life saving challenges that the NHS faces on an hourly basis. But all of this needs to be covered through voluntary fund raising. It is here that Freemasons



of the Province of Worcestershire are making a difference. At the 2024 Prescott Bike Festival, Andy Philpott, on behalf of Worcestershire Widows Sons and Worcestershire Freemasons, and as founding President of the Worcester Chapter of the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association, along with David Dey (ProvGCS) presented a brand new blood bike to the Severn Freewheelers Emergency Voluntary Service.

Proudly, it has been named 'The Widows Son' and has already been put into service. In particular the bike has been used on routine and urgent replenishment of the 'blood on board' of the Midland Air Ambulance. It will also be used to work with other charitable organisations such as 'The Human Milk Foundation' for transporting donor milk to treat babies that may be in intensive care.

Worcester Masons are keeping a 'very keen eye in their rear view mirrors' at it makes its rounds in the Province. It is fully 'logo'd' and liveried in Widows Sons and the logos from the Chapter, and of Worcestershire Freemasons, making it a standout proof point of 'masonry in action'. More importantly, it is a tangible example of the community service that masons do.

This achievement was the result of raising over £20,000, the majority from the Widows Son Chapter members and associates. It also involved various events and talks from the Widows Sons to many of the lodges in the Province, who were all enthusiastic to support the initiative. It saw a range of generous donations from many lodges, including £4,000

from the Worcestershire Province and the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF).

Amazingly, this was all achieved within 8 months! It is a fantastic achievement from the initial ambitious goal setting (of raising the funds within a year) by the Chapter at its AGM in June 2023 (almost the equivalent of a Masonic 'moon shot'), for a charity which is close to the hearts of so many masons, the biking fraternity and the local community. This is simply what Freemasonry in Worcestershire is about. Even more astonishingly, the Widows Sons surpassed their target in just eight months! To gather such donations, by Masonic driven private actions, involving no 'tin rattling' is a supreme achievement.

The Widows Sons is a group open to any Freemason with an interest in Motorcycling. It is increasingly these Masonic related groups that are acting as the feeder organisations to grow our fraternity. Andy explained that, "when we are out and about on our Motorcycles, proudly displaying our Freemasons Logos. we often get approached (or indeed take the initiative!) to explain what Freemasonry is all about, and the camaraderie of the Widows Sons - which has resulted in a number of people joining us, and then on to a Worcestershire Lodge" - Proving that a passion, in the form of a special interest group attached to a lodge is the perfect step (or in this instance a friendly rideout) onto the square. It's the combination of new friendships and opportunities for genuine community service that are igniting a revived interest in masonry in Worcestershire.





The Stonecutters Round Up of 2024 so far...

2024 started with a conveyor belt like series of storms, bringing very dangerous road conditions to the South West of England. A few of our members managed to travel to The Green Dragon for our first Natter Night of the year, however, most members were unable to safely travel due to the flash floods caused by the storms. Although the weather curtailed our riding, it did not impact our Freemasonry.

On 25 January, members of the Stonecutters visited New Temple Lodge No. 8435 in Swindon to see one of our Masonic Cornerstones, "Princess" being passed to the Second Degree. We did not expect to visit again a month later for his Raising and to patch him a Widows Son! On 26 January, members of the Stonecutters visited Highworth Royal Arch Chapter No. 9009 to see "Spanner" being exalted into Royal Arch Freemasonry, while the non-Royal Arch Freemasons and our partners met for our monthly quiz night.

The Stonecutters held our Annual Easter Egg Run on Saturday 9th March, where we delivered Easter Eggs to Julia's House Children's Hospice in Devizes. It was great to see all our friends at Julia's House. The following weekend, four of our members travelled to Duncarron Medieval Fort, the home of the Branded Widows Son. The weather at Duncarron was very cold and wet, but that did not detract from the ceremony itself.

The Stonecutters assembled in the early hours of 24th March to meet up with members of our daughter Chapter, the Quarrymen (from Dorset) for a ride to Loomies Motorcycle Cafe. When we arrived, we were met by members of most Widows Sons Chapters that are based in the South of England. We had a great catch up over a bacon and egg butty and a tea or coffee. Finally, our Immediate Past President, "Ozzy" presented a cheque for £150 to the Dan Payne Memorial Fund which is a small, local cancer support charity.





On Sunday 21 April 2024, the Stonecutters gathered at Devizes Masonic Hall for our "Great Provincial Rideout." We visited every Masonic Hall that is currently in use in Wiltshire Province. We stopped at each Masonic Hall to take a group photograph as "proof" of our visit. The route was approximately 160 miles long and with photo stops, breaks and fuel stops took seven hours. May was quite a blur of a month due to good weather resulting in more rides and quite a lot of masonic activity amongst our members. We started the month with a Raising of one of our Cornerstones, "Bambi" which coincided with the 20th Anniversary of the WSMBA. We patched "Standown!" a Widows Son during our Bank Holiday rideout. "Harley David(Son)" was installed as Master of his Lodge, while "Spanner" was Proclaimed in office for a second term. Our Royal Arch Masons also attended Provincial Grand Chapter and our Secretary was Exalted and a

further six Stonecutters became joining members of St Aldehelm Chapter No. 2888. We also rode to visit Weymouth Veterans Hub with our daughter Chapter, the Quarrymen.

In early June, the Stonecutters rode from Salisbury to Bournemouth for the annual Classics at the Knole show, which is a charity event held at Bournemouth Masonic Hall. It was quite a unique day which saw members of Southern, Stonecutters and Quarrymen Chapters all come together for the day.

Over the weekend of 21 - 23 June, members of the Stonecutters made their way to Great Yarmouth to "Chase the Sun". The riders rose before sunrise which marks the start of the "Chase", the aim of which is to make it to Lands End before sunset. At 0445hrs, the bikes departed from Great Yarmouth and made their way via Cambridge to Milton Keynes before dropping onto the A303 and A30 with the occasional rest and fuel stop enroute. They arrived at Lands End with plenty of time to spare.

Finally, the Stonecutters along with Wyvern, Pilgrims, Quarrymen and Brycgstow Chapters organised and attended the National Rally where we were lucky enough to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the WSMBA and the 5th Anniversary of our own Chartering. Several of our members darted down to Newton Abbot having been involved in an unfortunate RTI enroute. We also patched a Cornerstone and also patched "Bambi" as a Widows Son. A great time was had by all. We are now about to hold our VP's Annual Ride and BBQ.





WSMBA chapter website design

- Got a chapter?
- Want a website?

If you answered "Yes" to these two questions then this article is for you!

In issue 7 of The Son we discussed how the wsmba. uk domain is set up and how each chapter has their own domain beneath it, shires.wsmba.uk for instance. These subdomains are mostly used for emails but with a little bit of work you can also have a website that uses your chapter domain name to access it.

The technical bit

The association offers a web hosting facility to all WSMBA chapters. You design your website on your own machine and upload it to our platform and we allow the rest of the digital world to see it.

The domain is secured with an SSL certificate so people can trust that our sites are safe and can be trusted (but see below on design software).

Your bit

First, you will need to find a website designer that you can lubricate with intoxicating liquids until they agree to design your website for you. Alternatively you can create it yourself if you're willing to learn, it's really not difficult, read on.

Software

There are many different software applications that you can use to create your website and the cost varies from free to thousands of pounds to buy and use. We will focus on the two.

Mobirise

Mobirise is free software that runs on both Windows and MacOS machines. This software is highly recommended because although it is free the final website has no forced advertising. The company makes its money from renting design templates but you don't have to use them.

There is a small learning curve but once you understand the basics it is simple to use and the WSMBA I.T. gurus are willing to answer any questions you may have.

A good example of a Mobirise website is our national one at https://wsmba.uk/

Wordpress

Like Mobirise, Wordpress is free to use and makes its money from renting templates and plug-ins, however we do not recommend the use of this software due to the number of security holes that these free plug-ins create, currently 333 published vulnerabilities, 118 not yet patched (and you have to downloaded the patch if it's fixed)*.

If you insist on using Wordpress and your site is found to be a source of infection then it will be shutdown and deleted immediately.

Hosting

However you design your site, once it is completed and you're happy with the result you will need to upload it to our hosting facility.

Send an email to <u>technical@wsmba.uk</u>, we will respond with the details you need to upload your site. Once you have this information you can transfer the site and thereafter add updates as and when you want to make changes.

Afterwards

- Now that your site is live you will need to keep it up to date.
- Make sure that photos are changed on occasion.
- If you keep a calendar on it then it is vital that old entries are removed and new items added frequently.
- Consider the timing of photos, Toy runs are great in winter but will look out of place by August, especially if they are over 12 months old.

Be safe or be scammed

You all what a phishing scam is, but what about smishing, vishing or quishing?

With mobile phones being some prevalent these days many phishing attacks use the different ways that you can access the internet to try and scam you.

Smishing

This involves getting a text message (SMS, WhatsApp or any platform that is used to send short messages) that urges you to click a link or call a number for some unclear-but-urgent reason. Packages with not enough postage is common but also alerts that you bank account is frozen or your credit card has been abused. Always check the web link address. Do you know who the send is? Remember, you can always contact the company direct yourself without clicking the link provided.

Vishing

Voice calls, often automated, claiming that your bank account or credit card has been frozen, or your computer is infected, and you need to speak to someone who will fix it for you. Don't call the number given or talk to the human, just hang up. Login using your banking app or call the credit card company yourself instead if you are worried.

If they claim you're infected with a virus then use a free on-line virus scanner from any well-known anti-virus company, like McAfee or Sophos.

Quishing

QR code phishing. Bad people will put up a QR code that pretends to be something else. A link to the restaurant's online version of the menu or to an app to order something online "for faster delivery" rather than wait. Phone cameras will display the URL that the code goes to so check that first before clicking. If it looks garbled or inaccurate then it is probably a fake. If it's an app then go directly to your app store and search for it. If it's a menu then go and get a real one!



When supplying articles please:

- Send them in Word Format or Plain Text as attachments only, these are the only acceptable formats.
- Please do not send articles as PDF's, in email bodies, PowerPoint or other non-text apps, this will
 result in your article being rejected, and/or missing its inclusion in the Magazine.
- Please title your article and the submission email with your Chapter name, subject of the email and that it is a submission for "The SON" Magazine - i.e. "West Midlands Chapter, Son Submission, Autumn 2024"
- Please spell and Grammar check your articles before sending (Word has Spell and Grammar Check tools - see https://bit.ly/3QJI0XX)
- Send images separately please use <u>descriptive image names</u> that reference the chapter name, article and approximate place they should be in your article. Do not put any text in "pic goes here" as this has to be manually edited out
- Please send original images only do not edit them down, crop, change resolution or process in any manner that may result in loss of image quality. We have sufficient server size to receive hi res images.
- Please do not send articles or attachments via time limited File transfer applications like WeTransfer
- Please limit the size of your submissions to an absolute maximum of 1,000 words minus images
 (using the Word count tool) This will make 2 pages in the magazine. The Editorial team may, upon
 consultation, take additional or larger articles if of special interest or importance.
 Important note: if you add images, you will need to subtract about 50 words per single column width
 image from your maximum. (so a 2 page doc with 4 pictures will only have room for 800 words)
- Publication is on the 1st of March, June, September and December. With a cut off two weeks before each issue. Cut off is **not** a target date! Please submit your article as soon as possible before the deadline if Chapters consistently send on deadline day, the result is a delayed edition the average time taken to assemble is 20-25 hours before editing process. We may have to bring the deadline forward, meaning it may become difficult to keep articles current.


